FIREFIGHTING ADVENTURE

Our Year 1 and Year 2 students embarked on a thrilling educational excursion to the Ascot Drive Fire Station. The visit was a memorable experience, offering the young learners a unique opportunity to explore the world of firefighters, learn about fire safety, and have fun while discovering the important tools and equipment used by fire crews.

As soon as the children arrived at Ascot Drive Fire Station, they were warmly welcomed by the fire crew. The firefighters introduced themselves and explained the purpose of their visit: to give the students an inside look at their daily work and teach them about fire safety. The children were excited to be in the presence of real-life heroes who are always ready to help in emergencies.

One of the most thrilling parts of the visit was when the children had the chance to sit inside a real fire engine. The fire crew showed them all the different parts of the engine, explaining the role each piece of equipment and explained how the fire engine carries all the essential tools needed in emergencies, from hoses to water tanks, and the children could see these in action. They even got to turn on the siren and lights, experiencing what it's like to be part of a fire response team.



The students were also allowed to handle some of the firefighting equipment. The firefighters demonstrated how they use hoses and other tools during an emergency. It was an exciting and interactive way for the children to engage with the tools that are so important to keeping their communities safe.

The fun continued as the students were invited to dress up as firefighters! The children put on full firefighter uniforms, which included jackets, helmets, boots, and gloves. They quickly discovered how heavy and protective the suits are. The fire crew explained that while the uniforms are designed to keep firefighters safe in dangerous situations, they can be quite heavy, especially when worn for long periods.

The students took turns wearing the suits, laughing and posing as they pretended to fight fires and save the day. It was a great way for them to understand the physical demands of being a firefighter and appreciate the challenges that the professionals face.
