Lastly, please ensure that all cricket bags, bats, and other equipment are stored in the Primary School shed before entering the main site



## **YEAR 3/4**

CLOYPER

This week, our students had the incredible opportunity to visit Crich Tramway Museum for a WWII experience day, immersing themselves in the sights, sounds, and challenges of wartime Britain.

During the visit, the children took part in a workshop where they tried their hand at decoding secret messages, an essential skill used by wartime spies and codebreakers. They also learned about the realities of rationing by budgeting clothing coupons—a fascinating insight into the tough choices families had to make during the war. Exploring replica artefacts brought history to life, helping them understand what everyday life was like during the 1940s.

One of the highlights of the day was learning about the important role trams played during the war. The children even had the chance to ride on vintage trams, experiencing first-hand a mode of transport used by many during that era.

To top off an exciting day, we were treated to a visit to an old-fashioned sweet shop, where the children received their very own ration of sweets, just as children would have during the war.

# IN THE CLASSROOMS



## **YEAR 3/4**

This week, our students have wrapped up their Science Fiction topic, exploring key features of the genre, developed their descriptive writing skills, and even created their own sci-fi-inspired stories.

Alongside this, the children have been busy rehearsing their performance poetry for the wonderful Performing Arts Evening. Their dedication and enthusiasm shone through as they perfected their delivery, using expression, rhythm, and movement to bring their poems to life on stage.

In Year 3 maths, pupils have been mastering addition and subtraction of lengths, learning to solve problems involving measurements in meters, centimeters, and millimeters. They have applied their knowledge to real-life contexts, developing a strong understanding of units of measurement.

In Year 4 maths, pupils have been tackling the concept of improper fractions, learning how to convert between improper fractions and mixed numbers. They have explored different visual representations and practical applications of fractions to deepen their understanding.

## **YEARS 5 & 6**

Excitement is building for Years 5 and 6 as they have now read the script for this year's muchanticipated summer production. With auditions scheduled for next Monday, students are eagerly preparing to showcase their acting and performance skills. The enthusiasm is already evident, and we can't wait to see the talent they bring to the stage!

## YEAR 6

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In English, Year 6 have started working on an important discussion-based writing topic: screen use. They have been learning how to write balanced discussion texts, exploring both the benefits and drawbacks of technology. Through class debates and research, they have been considering questions such as "Should screen time be limited?" and "How does technology impact learning and social interactions?" This work is helping them develop critical thinking skills, persuasive writing techniques, and the ability to present wellstructured arguments.

In Maths, Year 6 are continuing their decimals topic. They have been ordering, rounding, and performing calculations with decimals, focusing on how these skills apply to real-world situations such as money and measurement. As they progress, they will be tackling more complex decimal operations, preparing them for advanced problem-solving and transition to secondary-level maths.

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## YEAR 5

STORY

In English, pupils have been diving deeper into the world of biographies. They have been exploring the key features that make biographies engaging and informative, such as chronological structure, formal tone, and the use of third-person perspective. Through a variety of exercises, they have been refining their ability to apply these features accurately in their own writing.

In Maths we have started an exciting new topic on statistics. They are learning how to draw and interpret line graphs and work with two-way tables, which will help them analyze and compare data efficiently. This topic will give them valuable skills in understanding patterns and trends, both in real-life situations and in mathematical problem-solving.
